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Executive Summary

The report summarizes the needs identified for the area service by Deckerville Community Hospital (DCH), which is part of Aspire Rural Health System. The purpose of the report is to inform the community, decision makers and healthcare providers of the needs of the community. In addition, it also outlines focus areas and priorities identified by DCH and will be used to create an implementation plan for addressing those needs. The report also identified collaborative initiatives that are addressing community needs.

A Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) is conducted to objectively identify needs within a particular community. This approach helps to ensure that priorities are based on evidence and accurate information. In addition to reviewing data, gathering input from community members is also necessary to accurately gauge the health of the community. The community's experience is critical to accurate interpretation of data. This is the fifth cycle of Community Health Assessment and Planning which is completed every three years (2013, 2016, 2019, and 2022). In alignment with Affordable Care Act requirements, the 2025 CHNA report includes a review of the 2024 implementation plan and progress toward targets.

Most experts would agree that providing healthcare is becoming more challenging due to everchanging patient needs and expectations, the advancement of technology, evolving reimbursement models, and increasing costs. These challenges occur at a time when resources for families and healthcare providers are stretched, making the CHNA process even more critical. The process helps to direct resources and efforts to the issues that have the greatest potential for improving the health of the community. Successfully addressing priority issues increases life expectancy, improves quality of life and results in a savings to the healthcare system.

The CHNA was completed using a team-based approach to coordinate activities. The process includes several steps that guide the team to select priority health issues. In Fall 2025, the team will use this report to select strategies and organize them into an implementation plan.

Construction Update

Throughout 2025, Deckerville Community Hospital made several significant facility improvements. The hospital expanded its Orthopedic services with the addition of Dr. Alzahabi and opened the new Deckerville Healthcare Services building, which includes a larger Physical Therapy department and an expanded Deckerville Family Practice. This new space adds more patient rooms and streamlines workflow, helping patients receive care more quickly and comfortably.

Aspire EMS will also be increasing its presence in Deckerville in the near future.

DCH is currently developing a Parking Lot Expansion project to improve access for patients and visitors. The project will add 18,600 square feet of parking space, making the hospital's front entrance more convenient and accessible. The Communities We Serve

Deckerville Community Hospital serves a primarily rural population located in Michigan's Thumb region. Hospital utilization data identifies 11 ZIP codes that define the hospital's primary service area. According to the 2023 American Community Survey (ACS), the service area has a combined population of approximately 26,592 residents. The service area includes several towns and villages such as Sandusky, Harbor Beach, Carsonville, Croswell, Minden City, Deckerville, and Snover. Deckerville Community Hospital provides care to a community characterized by:

- Age: 20.9% of the population is under age 18, and 22.5% is age 65 or older.
- Race and Ethnicity: The population has limited racial diversity, with 91.9% identifying as Caucasian, 4.7% Hispanic, 2.2% two or more races, 0.6% Black, 0.3% some other race, 0.2% Asian, 0.1% American Indian or Alaska Native, and 0% Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander.
- Education: Within the Deckerville Community Hospital service area, 16.1% of individuals age 25 and older hold a Bachelor's degree or higher, compared to 31.8% in Michigan and 35.0% in the United States.
- Income: The average (mean) household income is \$79,025, which is lower than Michigan's average of \$96,229.
- Employment: 3.1% of residents reported being unemployed, compared to 3.6% of Michigan residents.
- Health Insurance: 6.1% of residents reported having no health insurance, compared to 5.0% statewide.
- Poverty: Across the 11 ZIP codes within the Deckerville Community Hospital service area, the percentage of families living below the poverty line ranges from 2.6% to 12.8%, compared to 8.8% for Michigan overall. ZIP-code-specific rates include: 7.2% (48401), 4.2% (48419), 8.7% (48422), 11.1% (48427), 7.2% (48441), 5.2% (48456), 2.6% (48465), 12.8% (48469), 5.7% (48470), 6.4% (48471), and 10.6% (48472).
- Self-Employment: The community has a higher rate of self-employed individuals (12.1%) compared to Michigan (9.5%) and the United States (11.0%).

What is a CHNA?

A Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) is a federally mandated process for tax-exempt hospitals, established under the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act. The CHNA process ensures that hospitals systematically identify and address the most significant health needs within their service areas. It provides hospitals with essential data and community input to guide the development of programs, services, and partnerships that meaningfully improve community health.

Beyond compliance, the CHNA process promotes collaboration by aligning hospital community benefit efforts with broader initiatives aimed at enhancing health and well-being across the region.

The healthcare environment continues to evolve rapidly. In addition to responding to the effects of a global pandemic during the most recent CHNA cycle, hospitals face multiple ongoing challenges—including advancing technology, workforce recruitment and retention, increased training demands, and the rising health needs of an aging population. These pressures occur in a context of limited resources for families, providers, and health systems alike. As such, the CHNA process has become even more critical in ensuring that community resources are strategically directed to the areas of greatest impact.

Through the CHNA, hospitals can focus their efforts on health priorities that have the greatest potential to extend life expectancy, enhance quality of life, and reduce long-term healthcare costs. The findings of the assessment guide the identification of key health priorities and inform the development of targeted strategies. These strategies are formalized within an Implementation Plan, which outlines specific, measurable actions to improve community health outcomes.

IRS-Required CHNA Components

According to the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), hospitals must:

1. Define the community served.
2. Assess the health needs of that community.
3. Solicit and consider input from individuals representing the broad interests of the community, including those with special knowledge or expertise in public health.
4. Document the CHNA findings in a written report adopted by an authorized governing body of the hospital.
5. Make the CHNA report publicly available to ensure transparency and accountability.

Process & Methodology

The first step in addressing community health needs is to identify them. Using an objective, evidence-based approach ensures that priorities are grounded in accurate and comprehensive information. Deckerville Community Hospital conducted its 2025 Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) using a structured methodology that incorporated multiple sources of quantitative and qualitative data. When multiple data points indicate the same area of need, the likelihood of achieving meaningful impact through targeted interventions increases.



The Thumb Community Health Partnership (TCHP), a collaborative network representing Huron, Lapeer, Sanilac, and Tuscola Counties, provided key support throughout the CHNA process. TCHP compiled data from multiple public and proprietary sources and conducted a regional community health survey in fall 2024.

Building on this foundation, Deckerville Community Hospital led the assessment process, facilitating prioritization exercises that identified the most pressing health concerns based on health indicator data, community input, and surveys from leadership and the hospital foundation. Priorities established in 2022 and progress on the 2022–2024 Implementation Plan were also reviewed and considered.

The process followed the Association for Community Health Improvement (ACHI) framework, adhering to the six-step model outlined in the ACHI Community Health Assessment Toolkit. The team utilized the toolkit’s recommended methods and resources to guide each phase—from data collection and analysis to community engagement, prioritization, and planning.

Three types of data sources were utilized during the CHNA. The Team obtained the most recent data available and whenever possible, data that compared the local community to county, regional, state, or national statistics was used.

- Demographic Data
- Community Surveys

Data was compiled into comparison charts for peer counties, Sanilac County, and Michigan.

Representing the Community

Input from individuals was gathered through the Community Health Survey.

Representation from vulnerable populations was evident based on self-reporting within the survey. Of the 139 respondents from the service area, 58.3% identified as belonging to a vulnerable population, ensuring that the perspectives of those most at risk were included in the assessment process.

Review of Previous CHNA

1.Cancer

- Over the past year, infusion services have been expanded at Deckerville Community Hospital.
- Aspire Rural Health System Foundation is home to the B.C.U.P.S. and P.C.U.P.S. programs that serve to provide financial assistance and spread awareness of Breast Cancer and Prostate Cancer.
- DCH is a Covenant Region Thumb Network (CRTN) partner of the Covenant Cancer Care at Aspire Marlette, dedicated to expanding cancer care services in the Thumb.
- DCH participated in several campaigns for cancer awareness, including colorectal and breast cancer.

2.Chronic Disease

- Patients of Deckerville Community Hospital have access to Diabetic Education classes at Aspire Cass City and Aspire Marlette locations, expanding access to DCH's patients.
- Deckerville Community Hospital opened Cardiopulmonary Rehab in 2024 to improve access to chronic disease management as it relates to cardiopulmonary diseases.
- As a partner of Aspire Rural Health System, DCH patients now have greater access to wound and pain clinics and its services, including Aspire Marlette's new hyperbaric chamber.
- Deckerville Community Hospital now utilizes the ACO Population Management Dashboard, Prevention, and Screening Measurements, and monthly health month awareness campaigns to identify those individuals who need those screenings and notify them, "It's Time for your Yearly Screening".

3.Substance Use/Mental Health

- Aspire Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT) Clinic opened in 2025 to address substance use disorder.
- Aspire Rural Health System received a grant from the Michigan Health and Hospital Association (MHA) to expand Peer Recovery Coach services for Aspire patients.

4.Tobacco Use & Vaping

- Aspire Rural Health System has been working with local community school districts to develop resources for tobacco use and vaping in school-aged students.

5.Prenatal and Infant Health

- Deckerville Healthcare Services has expanded and now has new family medical providers.
- Aspire Women's Health Clinic expanded services in July 2025, including hiring FNP-C, Michelle Burgess, in Marlette.
- Aspire Rural Health System performs car seat checks for community members and offers them at community events.

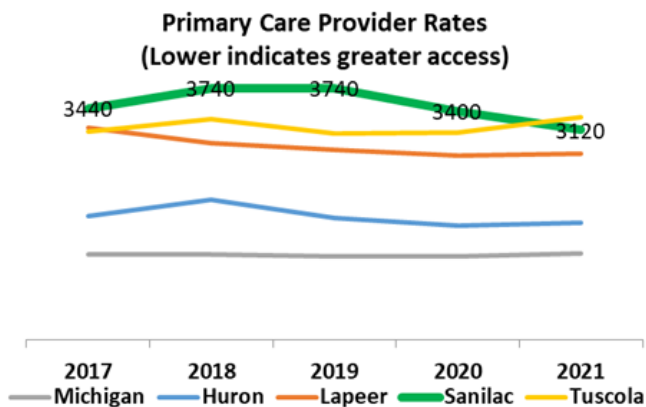

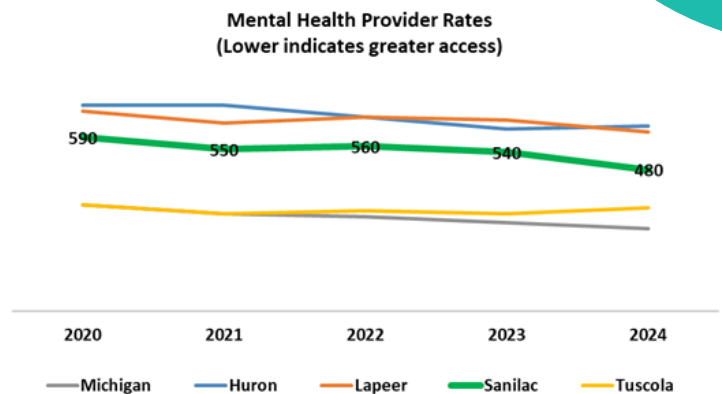

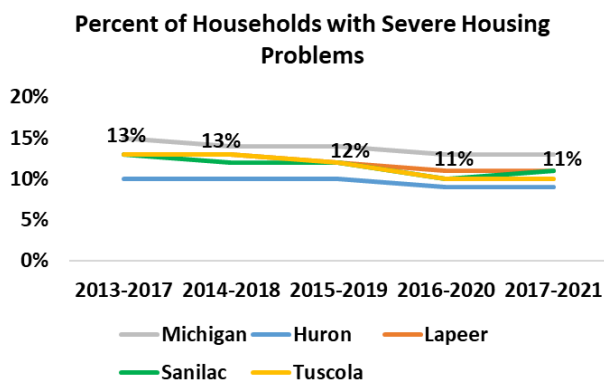

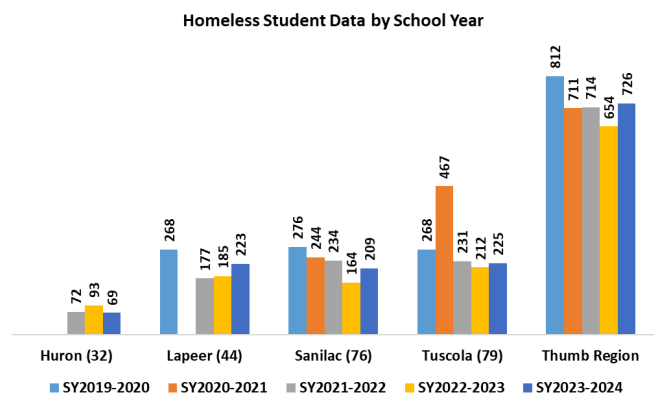
Coordination of Services

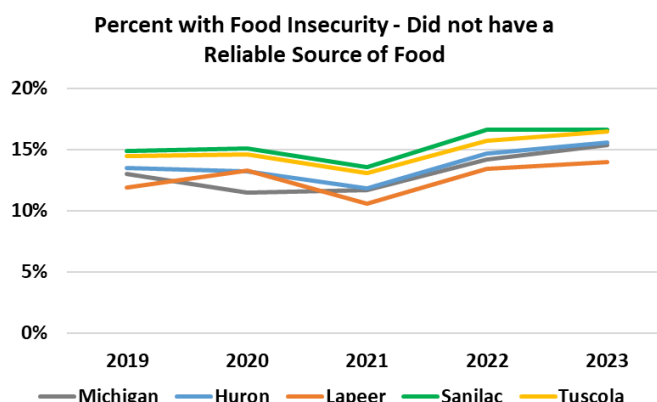
Social Determinants of Health

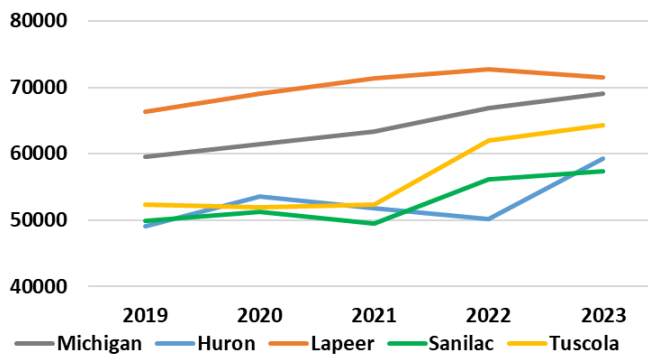

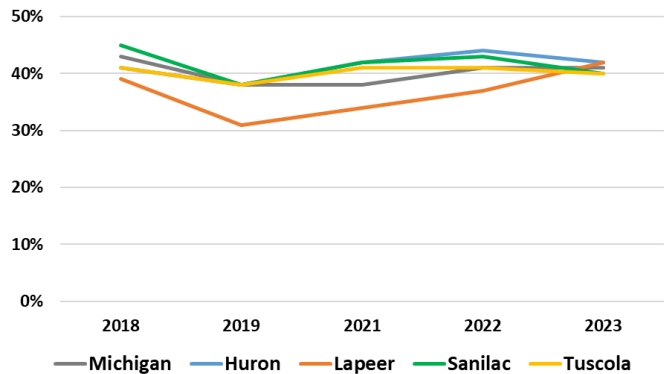
Availability and Access to Services

Median Income



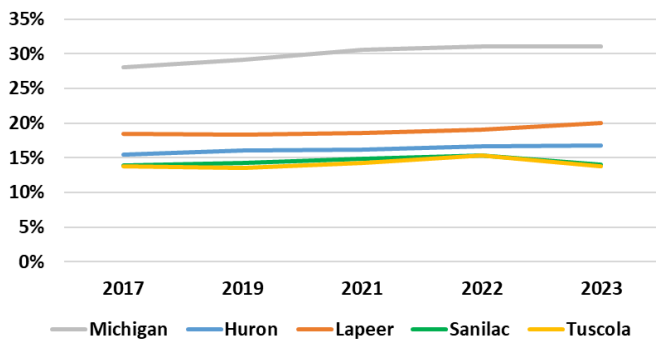

Percent of households below ALICE Threshold (cost of living)



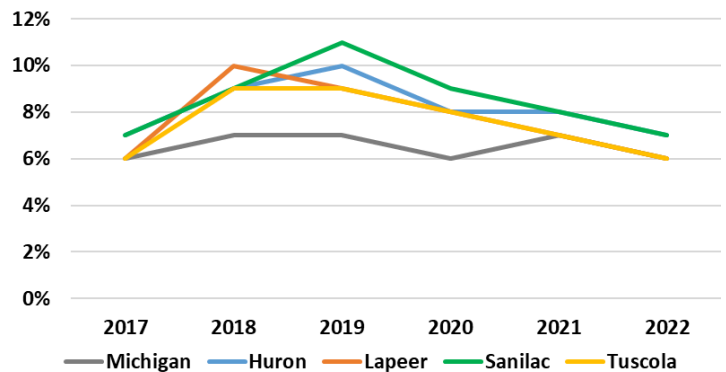

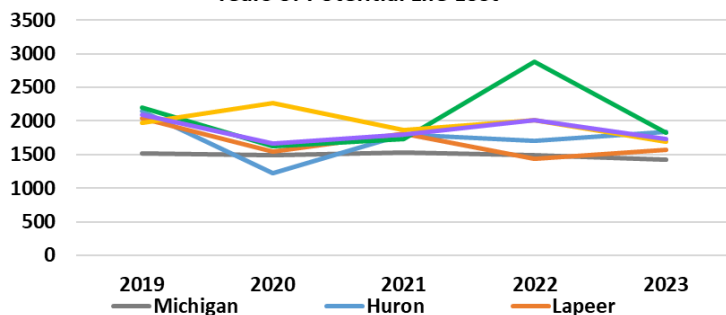
Percent of People < 65 that are Uninsured

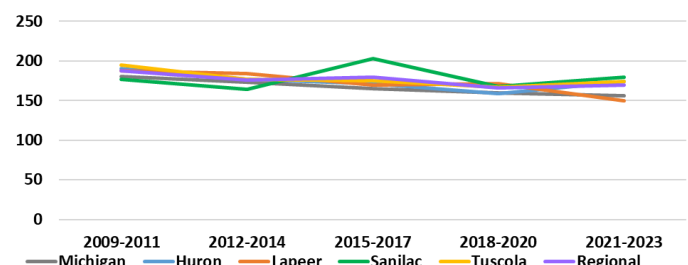

Cancer Mortality Trends Age Adjusted Rate/100,000



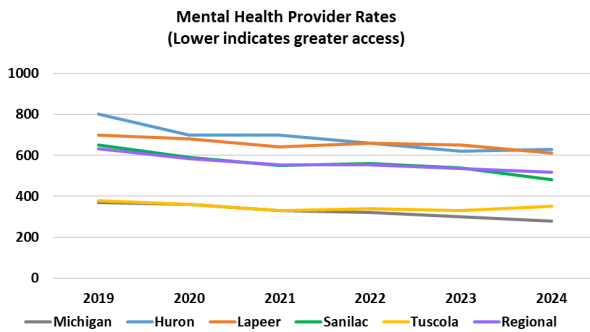

Mortality Rates/100,000 by type of cancer in Sanilac County 2017 - 2021

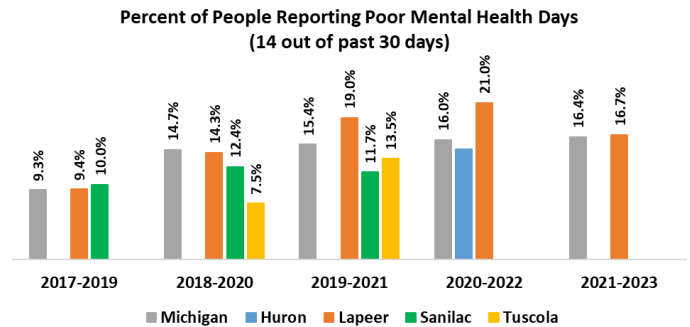

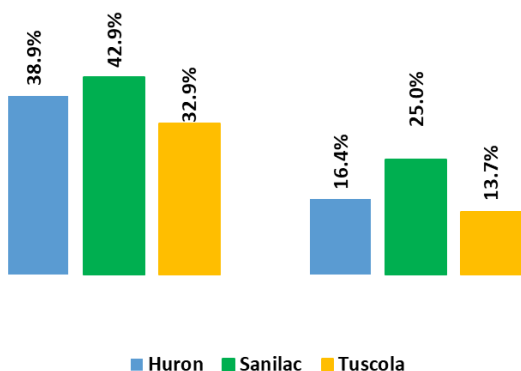

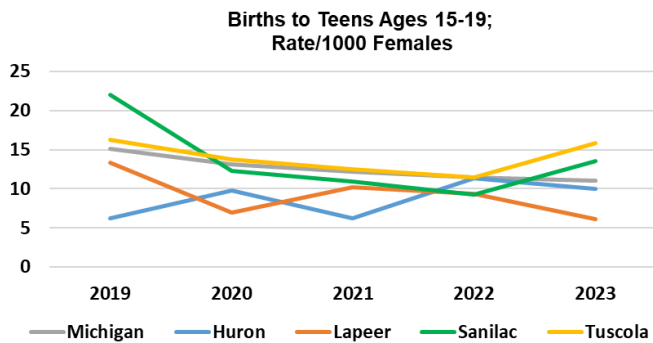
9th & 11th grade Depression and Suicidal Ideations



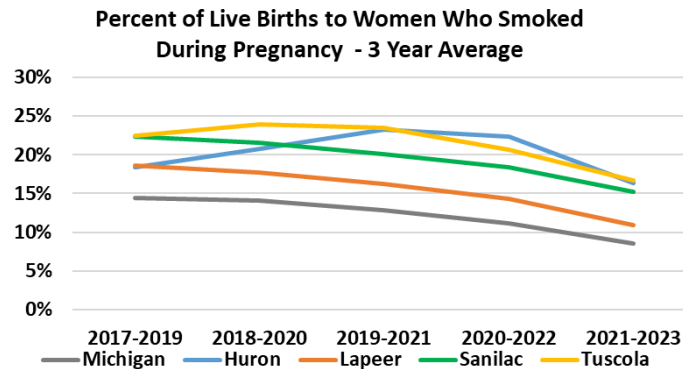

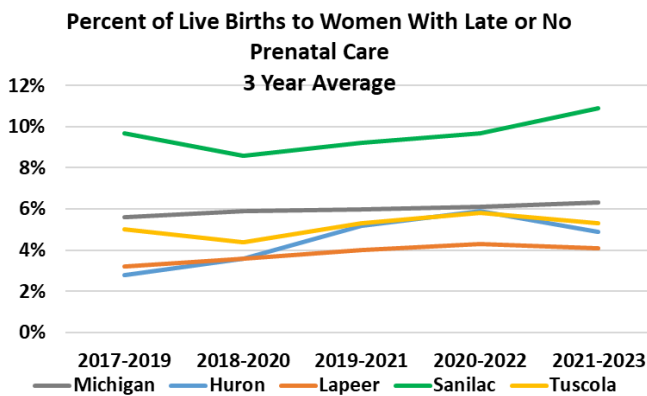

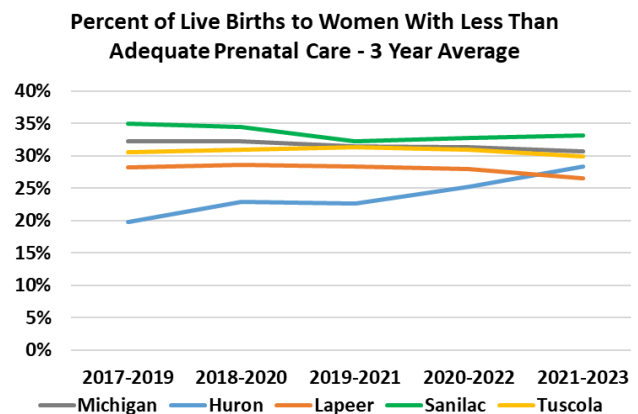

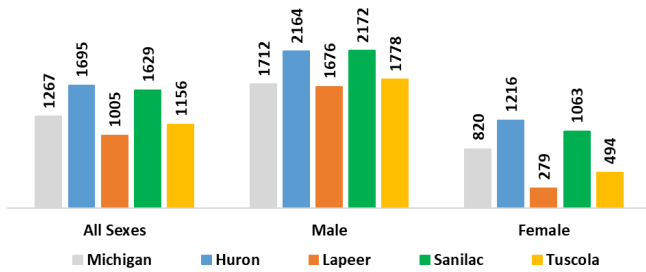

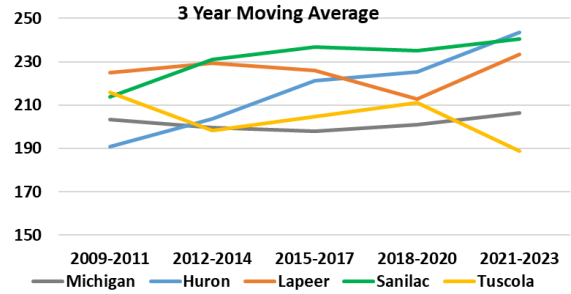

2023 Heart Disease Rate/100,000 Years of Potential Life Lost



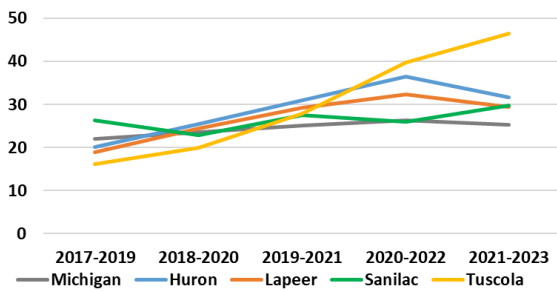

Heart Disease Mortality Age Adjusted Rate/100,000



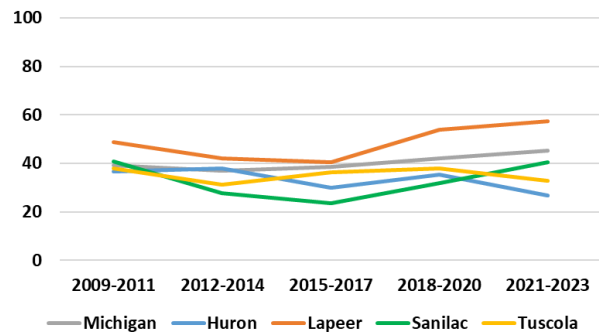

Diabetes Mortality - Age Adjusted Rate/100,000

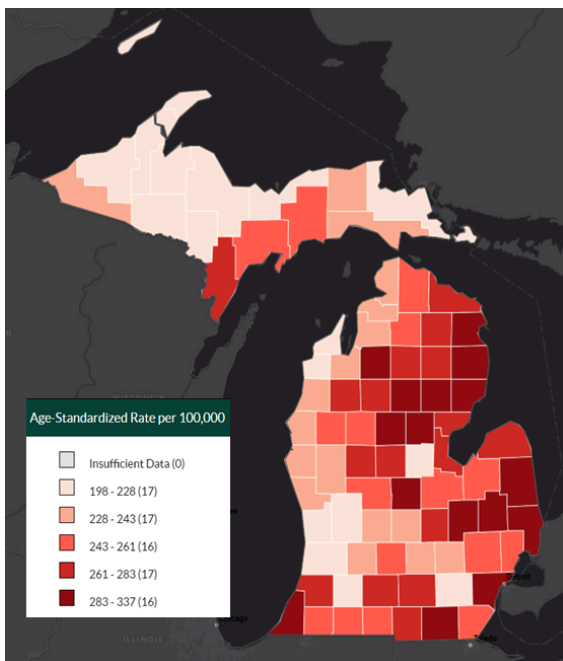

Community Needs & Priorities

The CHNA Team reviewed data, assessed internal resources, and identified the following priority areas for greatest impact:

- In Sanilac County, **MENTAL HEALTH** remains a key concern due to both rising need and limited provider access. The Michigan Department of Health & Human Services (MDHHS) reports that 11.7% of adults experienced 14 or more poor mental health days in 2019–2021, compared with the state average of 15.4%. Data from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation’s County Health Rankings & Roadmaps further show that Sanilac continues to have a higher population-to-provider ratio than Michigan overall, reflecting limited access to care. These findings highlight the importance of expanding local mental health services, early intervention, and prevention initiatives to meet growing community needs.
- The data show that **CHRONIC DISEASE** is a major and growing concern in Sanilac County. Heart disease mortality has remained above the state average for more than a decade, with recent increases and high levels of premature death, especially among men. Stroke mortality has also risen in the most recent reporting period, again exceeding statewide trends. Diabetes mortality continues to climb across the Thumb region, including in Sanilac County, indicating worsening disease burden and gaps in prevention and management. The statewide cardiovascular map further highlights the Thumb as a higher-risk area compared to many other Michigan counties.
- **SUBSTANCE USE** remains a concern in Sanilac County, with roughly 20% of adults engaging in binge or heavy drinking and drug poisoning deaths consistently ranging from 15–18 per 100,000. These steady but significant levels—paired with rising statewide overdose trends—highlight the need for stronger prevention, early intervention, and recovery supports to reduce substance-related harm in the community.
- **CANCER** remains a significant health concern in Sanilac County, with several cancer types showing notable mortality rates. Lung cancer stands out at 39.3 deaths per 100,000, making it the leading cancer-related cause of death locally. Breast, colorectal, and prostate cancers also show meaningful mortality burdens, with rates of 19.1, 19.4, and 20.6 per 100,000 respectively. These rates indicate that multiple forms of cancer are impacting residents at levels that warrant focused attention. High lung cancer mortality, combined with substantial deaths from preventable or screenable cancers like breast, colorectal, and prostate cancer, signals a need for strengthened prevention, early detection, and treatment pathways.
- Sanilac County continues to show notable **PRENATAL & INFANT HEALTH** challenges, particularly in prenatal care and maternal risk behaviors. Rates of late or no prenatal care have risen to over 10%, the highest in the region, and less-than-adequate prenatal care remains above 30%, exceeding state and neighboring-county averages. Although smoking during pregnancy has declined, Sanilac’s rates have consistently been higher than Michigan’s, and teen birth rates also remain elevated compared to statewide trends. These patterns emphasize the need to strengthen early prenatal engagement, maternal health supports, and prevention efforts to improve birth outcomes in Sanilac County.
